THE PROGRAM CHAIR'S PERSPECTIVE FOR 2023-2024

Will that be online, in person, and/or streamed? Actually, all of the above, and only some of the time.

For MCC's 131st year, you can look forward to 35 meetings spread over 34 weeks: 15 meetings in the fall and 20 in the winter. There are 34 meetings on Wednesday nights and one on a Saturday morning.

At press time,18 meetings are **online**, while 17 are both **in person** (finally back at Westmount Park United Church!) as well as **streamed** on Webex. Here's hoping power outages, snowstorms or a COVID resurgence won't oblige us to change the how/where/when we meet.

In a nutshell, here's the plan:

- · Online: all guest-speaker and member-speaker meetings, and the Slideshow competition
- In person & streamed: competitions (except for the Slideshow); challenges (except for Abstract Photography); opening meeting, holiday potluck, closing meeting. Streaming is available for out-of-province MCC members, snowbirds, and LCC members

In case you're wondering, guest speaker events continue online because we can invite speakers from almost anywhere—this year they're from Canada, the USA and England—and it's certainly budget-friendly.

Two of the presentations address techniques: intentional camera movement (ICM), and multiple exposure (ME). Four deal with genres: abstract, B&W landscape, documentary & stock, and street. And for variety there are evenings on an artwork to spark your creativity, the Japanese aesthetic of the imperfect, ethics and post-processing, and judging and the judging process.

You'll notice the Japanese theme is also present in two member talks (photo haiga, cherry blossom season), while travel photography (the Falkland islands, Japan, and Tuscany) is the subject of four member talks, and miniature photography with vintage lenses in another.

PHIL NORTON

Regional Documentary and Stock Photography

Wednesday, September 13, 2023 (Online Meeting)

Bio

Phil Norton's lifelong pursuit has been documenting counties and regions across North America. As it happens, 1957 Pittsburgh was when and where Norton was born and *Life Magazine* photographer W. Eugene Smith was documenting the Smoky Steel City in black and white.

In 1972, Norton purchased his first camera, a 35 mm Pentax Spotmatic, and continued the family tradition of photography. On a bicycle trip around the Great Lakes in 1979, he met the French-Canadian woman who would become his wife, immigrated to Montreal around the time of the Quebec referendum on sovereignty, learned French, relocated south to the US border, and rented an old Canada Customs house, his base for documenting the Chateauguay Valley for 26 years.

He was editor of the Huntingdon Gleaner bilingual weekly newspaper in

1983, became a full-time photojournalist and columnist for Chateauguay community newspapers from 1993 to 1996, then moved to the Montreal Gazette where he shot news assignments and ran sales of the photo archives from the Star to the Herald and Standard.

He moved to Prince Edward County, Ontario in 2007; leading group trips became his full-time occupation in 2012, offering local and eventually "Photography Adventures" to all corners of North America. Post COVID he's gradually resumed tour guiding, speaking, flying drones, and teaching smartphone photography as a professional tool.

His work has appeared in Canadian magazines and calendars, and he contributed to A Four Season County— Prince Edward and Hastings, 2023.

Regional Documentary and Stock Photography

Regional documentary means using all available visual and audio devices to record every aspect of a geographic area in all seasons and at all times of day. People's homes and workplaces, landscapes, weather, and the natural world are the subjects to find and photograph.

One day you're in a field of wildflowers aiming a macro lens at dragonflies; the next you're gripping the railing of a rocking lobster boat with one hand and clicking the shutter with the other. It requires multiple abilities beyond manipulating a camera—the research and intuition of a journalist, an explorer's physical endurance and mental perseverance, a psychologist's people skills, and an artist's eye.

Norton will show images from rural and urban regions where he has lived near Pittsburgh, Montreal, and Toronto, as well as the cross-section of America he documented while bicycling and camping from Canada to Mexico during the pandemic.

Finally, he'll touch on the history and current state of stock photography.

The Art and Beauty of Intentional Camera Movement (ICM) Photography

The art and beauty of ICM photography is that, by seeing things differently, we can connect with the ordinary, and even the mundane, to transform how we interact with our surroundings . . . to explore, experiment, and play with the camera in exciting new ways, resulting in images that are unique to each individual photographer.

Stephanie will share her passion for ICM and talk about her journey from traditional landscape photographer to focusing primarily on ICM photography. She has a deep love and joy for the individually expressive nature of ICM and encourages photographers to see things differently through the lens of their cameras, as well as through the lens of their inner creative selves.

Stephanie will cover some of the basic ICM principles and techniques, along with sample images to show the effects of various camera movements and the camera settings for each. Additionally, she will present several examples of scenes before and after using ICM, as well as a short field-work video to show some of the camera movements she uses in different location settings.

She will also touch on some more advanced ICM techniques such as multiple exposure ICMs and present a section on mobile ICMs for the growing trend towards creating with mobile devices.

Abstract Photography, and a Challenge

Bio

I'm **Tony North**, a photographer based in Manchester, England. My main passions are macro and landscape photography.

I have always loved nature, but there's something about spending a few hours in a wildflower meadow capturing images of butterflies and dragonflies that really excites me. I love revealing the amazing beauty of the world of miniature beasts and sharing that with others.

Equally I love walking through and photographing beautiful scenery—whether rural, coastal, or urban. A special interest of mine is astrophotography—especially capturing the Milky Way over some dramatic scene.

I also enjoy competing, whether in BPE Salons or in major competitions such as the International Garden Photographer of the Year, which I won outright in 2023, or Amateur Photographer of the Year, in which I came 2nd overall in 2020.

Abstract Photography, and a Challenge

Tony North presents his perspective on abstract art and photography, specifically:

- What is abstract art? We look at a few examples from the history of art and photography, and try to arrive at a definition. I present my 7-point scale of abstraction, from purely figurative to purely abstract, showing examples of my own images to illustrate.
- What is good abstract photography? We now consider some artistic principles important in good abstract photography, such as composition and colour harmonies.
- 3. How can we create good abstract photos? This is the main part of the talk in which I show examples of my own abstract images. I cover some of the many subjects, locations, and techniques you can use to create abstract photos.

Finally, I show some of my creative images, that is, images made using techniques such as multiple exposure, ICM (intentional camera movement) and collage. This includes the leaf collage shown here which came 3rd in the Abstract Views contest of International Garden Photographer of the Year 2021.

Tony's Challenge

Find a suitable outdoor surface—natural or artificial—and create an abstract image from it, photographing a fairly small area of no more than about 50 cm wide (a macro lens would be ideal). Use a tripod and a narrow aperture (or focus stack) to get full sharpness through the whole frame. Concentrate especially on composition; aim to achieve a pleasing balance and harmony of the elements, and include a focal point, if possible. Submit up to three images by February 17, 2024 to events@montrealcameraclub.com.

TONY NORTH'S ABSTRACT PHOTOGRAPHY CHALLENGE

Check out the wonderful range of submissions in response to Tony North's challenge to create an abstract image of an outdoor natural or artificial surface no larger than 50 cm in width.

Can you tell if the images got full sharpness throughout the whole frame because they were shot on a tripod? Used a narrow aperture? Relied on focus stacking?

Do all the images have a focal point? Does it matter?

Is there a pleasing balance and harmony of all the elements within each image?

Reality vs Artistry vs Deception in Photography

From its very beginnings almost two centuries ago, photography has sparked controversy in the art world. In recent years the tension has escalated as sophisticated tools like Photoshop and Al software push the boundaries between reality and illusion, challenging our perceptions and posing troublesome questions about the purpose and ethics of our image-making.

Many people wonder, for instance, whether authenticity should be a requirement in a photograph and how much editing is acceptable in its creation. Are deceptive images ever acceptable? Do current trends in shooting and processing make our images more artistic or less? Do they even qualify as "photographs"?

In this presentation, Kas addresses these questions candidly, using examples from her extensive portfolio of "photographic art" to inspire you to think in a new way about why and how you make your own images.

Wabi Sabi—The Beauty of the Imperfect

"Wabi sabi is an aesthetic of poverty and loneliness, imperfection and austerity, affirmation, and melancholy, Wabi sabi is the beauty of the withered, weathered, tarnished, scarred, intimate, coarse, earthly, evanescent, tentative, ephemeral." Crispin Sartwell, Six Names of Beauty, 2006.

As nature photographers we often seek out the flowers, leaves and such that are perfect, that have no blemishes or defects. This presentation highlights subjects that are not perfect: a deformed coneflower that stands out as flawed and hence different and beautiful, flowers with character, double-headed flowers, decaying autumn leaves, rust as it creates abstract patterns amidst the decay, etc. As purveyors of rust and decay, we appreciate the perseverance and beauty of "life after humans" as cars and equipment fall apart and succumb to oxidation and decay.

Wabi sabi teaches us to find beauty in everyday life. It is a kind of anti-aesthetic, an alternative to the dominating discriminatory ideas we hold about beauty. It is a way of honoring that everything is impermanent and that we are always in a state of both becoming and falling away. It is used to describe a particular philosophy that beauty can be found in the old, the everyday, the imperfect.

This talk will cover:

- The concepts of wabi sabi
- The beauty of imperfect and/or unconventional subjects
- The concept of slowing down and appreciating the beauty of everyday life, of things that might be overlooked
- How to embrace shadows and empower light to make your subject matter, even dead subject matter, come alive
- How to tell stories through your images

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Panel Discussion on Club Competition Judging

Panel Discussion on Club Competition Judging

- · Why do clubs have competitions?
- Why do members participate in club competitions?
- · What are the benefits and limitations of judging and the judging process?
- Are camera club competitions an appropriate lens through which to view and make images?

Competitions have been part of the MCC since it was founded in 1892. What's more, the club acquired a reputation for having a competitive culture. And yet, over the years, the number of competitions has gradually been reduced —Pictorial and Nature competitions each went down from five to four in 2022-2023 and Print from five to none in 2020-2021.

When members' expectations about competitions aren't met, or when their own images in specific competitions score below their expectations, they are typically very communicative about their dissatisfaction. And that was my impetus for setting up this panel discussion: to provide members with insights into what judging and the judging process can and cannot do.

Photographers are known to be seekers of light; I hope they will find the panelists' responses to the questions below illuminating.

- 1. What is the judging process like from the perspective of a judge, for example, the challenges, the difficulties, the compromises, the rewards?
- 2. When scoring images, how is it possible for judges to balance objectivity and consistency against the inevitable influence of their personal preferences, experiences, cultural background, gender, and age?
- 3. Is it indeed the case that the best images rise to the top and receive the highest scores, or do other factors play a role in competition success?
- 4. What advice could judges give to those members who wish to do well in competitions?
- 5. Is the main purpose of competition to be an educational opportunity that helps participants and viewers become better photographers? If so, how can judges' scoring and comments more effectively achieve this aim?
- 6. Is there a place in camera club competitions for images that do not conform to the generally agreed upon technical and compositional standards established by governing bodies, for example, images that judges consider as experimental, subtle, ambiguous, controversial, rule-breaking? If there is no place, what advice could judges give to members who choose to submit these kinds of images?

Panelist Bios

A Certified CAPA Judge, **Glenn Bloodworth** judges extensively in Canada and internationally, is CAPA's Director of the National Judges Program, a senior judging course trainer, and an assessor for its judging accreditation program. In 2020 he was invested as a Fellow (FCAPA) of the Canadian Association for Photographic Art (CAPA).

Glenn is a visual artist with degrees in Algonquin College's Photographic Techniques Program, and the School of Photographic Arts: Ottawa's Photographic Arts and Production. His work is in various public and private collections.

Competitions have their place in the arsenal of tools for photographers. But they also demand awareness, caution, and a thick skin.

The reality is that:

- You're going to lose more than you win.
- Most competitions are focused on pretty pictures, and not on the fine art in photography.
- No mătter the judges' expertise level, competition is usually about which photos are the most popular.
- Some judges are inconsistent in using a set of judging criteria, and usually display an
 implicit bias.
- And winning does not validate you as a photographer.




Rick Cloran is a well-known judge and lecturer in New England as well as throughout the US and Canada. He routinely judges six or more club competitions and three international exhibitions annually. For his service to photography both in New England and at a national level, he's been awarded the HonFPSA by the Photographic Society of America (PSA) and HonNEC by the New England Camera Club Council (NECCC). His success in exhibitions has earned him the GMPSA distinction.

While camera-club level competition is an excellent medium to learn and refine the technical side of our images, it should not be the sole driver of why we make images.

As competitors, we must remember that the judges viewing our image are uninformed observers, that is, with no knowledge of what we went through to capture or process the image, or background information about its story, and so have no emotional attachment to the image.

As judges, our first job is to put aside all of our background bias associated with images we have made, images we have seen of the subjects presented to us, and our personal relationship with the subject matter presented in the images we are asked to judge. Ideally, scoring should be objective and based on the quality of the images; the reality is that biases will likely come into play.



Certified as a CAPA judge in 2021, Stella actively participates in judging national competitions for CAPA and photography clubs across Canada. Her role as one of the primary judges for the Focus Camera Club, Moncton, NB, for the last three years highlights her commitment to nurturing emerging photographers through the educational opportunities that competitions provide.

Stella perceives competitions as avenues that go beyond mere competitiveness, acting as dynamic platforms for photographers to nurture and enhance their skills in a positive manner. She accentuates the importance of these contests in facilitating photographers' constructive self-assessments and sees them as pivotal evaluations that aid photographers in developing a discerning eye for their own images.

Kas Stone is a photographic artist based in Nova Scotia. She learned the ropes through active involvement in camera club programming and competitions, first as a participant, then as a presenter and competition judge. As a competitor she won awards at the club, national, and international levels. As a judge she specialized in landscape, fine art, and creative competitions, and acquired a reputation for thoughtful commentary and scoring.

A series of significant life events about a decade ago motivated Kas to return to Nova Scotia after twenty years in Ontario, and to shift from hobbyist to professional photographer. At the same time her image-making underwent a profound evolution. Kas now earns her living selling archival prints and speaking to photo groups. She is committed to making meaningful and expressive images rather than pretty or award-winning ones.

Kas no longer competes or judges. However, she is happy to offer (and receive!) considerate image critique as part of her teaching practice.

Moderator Bio

Program Chair **Diana Bruno**, a member of MCC since 2009, regularly submits to the club's competitions.

Over the years, she has observed that inconsistent scoring and non-constructive commenting by some judges at club competition evenings leave quite a few members discontented. And they're the ones most likely to stop competing or vote with their feet and leave the club.

To dispel the notion that judging evenings are an exercise in public humiliation, she organized this panel discussion for members to get a clearer view of the benefits and limitations of club competition judging as well as club competition participation.

- The presentation must be no longer than four (4) minutes. It may be shorter.
- Submissions will be accepted by various methods: WeTransfer to <u>slideshows@montrealcameraclub.com</u> or on a USB key with your name clearly indicated on the key.
- The file must be in .mov or .mp4 format.
- Presentations should be self-running (stand-alone, independent of the software used for their creation).

The presentation must be submitted no later than the date indicated on the 2023-2024 Calendar, so that it may be tested and a judging list prepared. Please note that we no longer accept entries on the evening of the competition.

Pictorial Competitions

There are four Pictorial competitions held each year, two in the fall and two in the winter/spring. At the end of the season, there is a competition for Image of the Year for the categories of General, Creative, and Photojournalism/Street.

General

Images in the Pictorial General (PG) category consist of any material that is pictorial (aesthetic), documentary, patterns—a broad category of images generally acceptable as photographic, non-commercial material

Creative

The Creative (CR) category promotes the manipulation of one or more images to create a fictional or conceptual image. A creative image typically exhibits an evident use of a person's imagination to alter reality. However, a creative image may be created in such a way that it could be mistaken for a Pictorial General image. In that case the word (composite), in brackets should be appended to the title.

Photojournalism

Photojournalism photography (PJ) consists of images that tell stories or document people affected by an event or a situation. Street photography features unmediated, chance encounters and random incidents, etc. in public places. Only global post-processing techniques are permitted such as tone, exposure, or colour adjustments. No selective adjustments are allowed. For example, nothing may be added, removed, or cloned. Cropping is permitted.

Theme

Pictorial 2 will include a Theme category—Leading Lines.



Pictorial Competition Rules & Quick Reference Guide



Title - is the image title. The maker can indicate that the image should not be mistaken for Pictorial General by adding the word "composite" in brackets at the end of the title. XX_YYYY_title(composite).jpg If the image submitted in PJ is Street then the word 'street" must be appended to the title in brackets. XX_YYYY title(street).jpg

NOTE: The judges may disqualify images NOT reflecting the category

The categories:

PG for Pictorial - General: i.e. interesting subject matter, from flowers to architecture, car details to ballet dancers

CR for Creative: an image that is created by the maker, usually a conceptual image, or a composite of several images

PJ for Photojournalism/Street: consists of images that tell stories, or document people affected by an event or a situation. Only basic post-processing is permitted such as cropping, tone and colour adjustment

ALL TITLES should be written without any underscores or all words stuck together. The title will be displayed with the image, so please give a relevant title and avoid spelling errors. Any entry not complying WILL BE RETURNED to the maker for correction.

Images should be submitted with their EXIF. This info is used to identify duplicate submissions, perform searches in the archives, and aid judging comments. Only f-stop, speed, ISO, focal length, and date are extracted.

Rules:

- Each photographer may enter a maximum of three (3) images per competition
- · Images previously entered in a Montreal Camera Club competition are NOT eligible
- Digital images must be submitted to <u>pictorial@montrealcameraclub.com</u> by the deadlines established—see calendar on pages 54 & 55 for details
- A maximum of eight (8) entries per year is allowed in any one category (Pictorial, Creative, and Photojournalism). If more than eight (8) images are entered into a category, only the first 8 images submitted will be used in the calculations for trophies, standings, and honours, etc.

Sizing:

- Digital images should be submitted with a maximum width of 3840 pixels and a maximum height of 2160 pixels
- Files should be saved as .jpg images with a high-quality setting

Nature Competitions

There are four Nature competitions each year, one in the fall and three in the winter/spring. There are four categories in Nature: Botany, General, Ornithology, and Zoology. At the end of the season there is a competition for Image of the Year for each category. The storytelling value of a Nature image is weighed more than the pictorial quality, although it must still display technical quality.

Definitions of the Nature categories:

Botany

Wildflowers, trees, plants, and fungi growing in the wild or cultivated in botanical gardens, etc. in their botanical form.

General

Natural phenomena such as landscapes or seascapes, rocks, fossils, astronomy, etc.

Ornithology

Undomesticated birds in their natural habitat, in a zoo, game farm, refuge, or aquarium.

Zoology

Mammals, reptiles, amphibians, and insects in their natural environment, in refuges, or in zoos.

NOTES:

Any trace of "hand of man" in a Nature image entry shall disqualify it from being accepted:

- · NO roads, houses, fences, electrical wires, mown grass, tool-cut wood, or humans
- NO horticultural varieties of plants (cultivated plants) such as tulips or daffodils, or still life studies (not found in nature)
- In the case of zoo/reserve animals or birds, NO cage bars, concrete walls, mown grass, zoo straw, bedding, etc.
- The Zoology category excludes domestic animals (dogs, cats, livestock, etc.), feral animals, or mounted/ museum specimens

Exception: Species associated with manmade features (for example: pelicans on pier posts, storks on tall manmade structures, barn owls in barns, etc).

Exception: During a Themed competition where the Nature Chair has permitted that the currant CAPA rules will be employed when it comes to the "hand of man."

In Nature, titles should be informative, but concise. Where possible, tell a story or provide information with nature value. Some judges like to see the scientific Latin name, in parentheses, after the common name of the plant or animal, although this is not essential. Include only what you have observed, not what you imagine might be happening.

MCC does not in any way condone baiting of birds or animals. Images made using baiting are ineligible for competition. Competition entries in which the subject(s) appear to have been baited should be accompanied by a note affirming that no baiting was used by the photographer or others present.



Images should be submitted with their EXIF. This info is used to identify duplicate submissions, perform searches in the archives, and aid judging comments. Only f-stop, speed, ISO, focal length, and date are extracted.

Rules:

- Each photographer may enter a maximum of three (3) images per competition
- · Images previously entered in a Montreal Camera Club competition are NOT eligible
- Digital images must be submitted to nature@montrealcameraclub.com by the deadlines established—see calendar on pages 54 & 55 for details
- A maximum of eight (8) entries per year is allowed in any one category: Botany (B), General (NG), Ornithology (O), and Zoology (Z). G1	Flowers in B&W	Black & white is a form of monochromatic photography that consists solely of shades of pure gray tones. In the absence of colour, there is an emphasis on lines, shapes, tone, contrast, textures, and patterns. Try decluttering or blurring the background by using a shallow depth of field. You want your floral subject to stand out.			
G2	Showing Perspective	Perspective in photography refers to the way in which the photographer captures the subject from a particular angle, distance, and vantage point. It is an essential element that directly affects how the viewer perceives the subject. An effective perspective creates a sense of depth, texture, and dimension in the photograph. Show us images that play on perspective. • Change your point of view: Experiment with different angles and viewpoints, move around your subject to find the best possible shots. Tilt, pan, and zoom to capture the subject creatively. • Get low or high: Shooting from a low or high angle can add a new dimension to your photographs. • Play with depth of field: Using different apertures can help you control the depth of field and the amount of the background that is in focus.			
G3	Rust	Use any angle or composition, but rust should be the primary subject.			
G4	People Playing	One or more people, indoor, outdoor, young or old. Experiment with various focal lengths, shutter speeds, and apertures to enhance the story behind your image.			
G5	Staircase	Look for unique angles that emphasize the leading lines and symmetry of the staircase.			
G6	Shadow	Shadows should be a prominent part of the composition to either enhance the subject, or as the subject itself.			
G7	Urban Reflections	If possible, it can be helpful to get close to the reflective surface, be it water, glass, or some other polished surface. Usually, it is best to not include the light source in the frame. The reflection can be enhanced if the reflective surface is in a shaded area			

Our club outings are an excellent opportunity to hone your skills and to get helpful advice for the themes.





Print Challenge Rules & Quick Reference Guide



ALL TITLES should be written without any underscores or all words stuck together. The title will be displayed with the image, so please give a relevant title and avoid spelling errors. Any entry not complying WILL BE RETURNED to the maker for correction.

Images should be submitted with their EXIF. This info is used to identify duplicate submissions, perform searches in the archives, and aid judging comments. Only f-stop, speed, ISO, focal length, and date are extracted.

Rules:

- Prints with overall tone or colour throughout (e.g. sepia, selenium, etc.) are designated as Monochrome
- Monochrome prints that have been selectively painted in a localized area are classified as colour, regardless of how small or large the area of colour
- The entrant must be the maker of the original digital image. However, the resultant print may be commercially produced
- Prints should be at least 9" on the long side and at least 8" on the short side of the image and matted to a maximum size of 16" x 20" (including the mount)
- Traditional mounting is required—the top with a bevel-cut, placed on top of the print with rear
 protective support. Flush-mounted prints are not accepted
- Each photographer may enter a maximum of three (3) images per Challenge
- Images that have been entered into the Print Challenges may be submitted to Montreal Camera Club competitions that are being scored
- · Images previously entered in a Montreal Camera Club competition are NOT eligible
- Digital images must be submitted to <u>print@montrealcameraclub.com</u> by the deadlines established—see calendar pages <u>54 & 55</u> for details





Dear members.

The SPPQ's Annual Interclub Digital Competition is the most significant provincial interclub digital competition.

We will be selecting 20 images (5 in each of the 4 categories) to represent the Club.

The selection will include images submitted by members to MCC competitions from the previous seasons and images submitted from September to December of the current year.

We would like members to submit additional images, particularly in the theme category, which is Tunnel, Bridges & Roads this year. So, please send images you would like to submit that have not already been submitted to the MCC competitions.



Send your images anytime from now to December 25, but the sooner the better!

HOW

Use the same file naming as for the MCC competitions.

Use the same sizing as for the MCC competitions.

There are 4 categories in the 2023-24 SPPQ inter-club competition:

- 1. Animals: Any species with hair or feathers, mammal (marine or land), amphibians (vertebrate or invertebrate), reptiles, and insects.
- 2. Human: A person or group of persons, in ANY kind of activity.
- 3. Nature: Natural landscapes and elements of nature: flowers; plants; minerals. (Images need to be without the presence of humans, birds, animals, or insects, and without man-made elements.)
- 4. Theme: "Tunnels, Bridges & Roads" As defined by SPPQ: Images are to highlight a land route connecting two points to cover a distance with any type of transport.

DUPLICATE SUBMISSIONS

You cannot submit an image that has previously been presented. An image is considered a duplicate if 20% or more of the content is the same as another image from the same photographer.

PARTICIPATION

Anyone can participate, but any given author can only participate through one club, for any of the activities of the SPPQ.

AUTHORIZATION

Each photographer will need to accept the SPPQ's authorization terms.
