Our new TV Monitor has been much appreciated

We are considering home judging for the competitions as practiced successfully by other clubs. There are advantages to that system, especially for outside judges, as they need only commit one evening of their time instead of two. There are problems to consider, such as using different monitors, which will undoubtedly have different calibrations, affecting the colour and brightness of the images being judged. Also, we need to provide an opportunity for judges to hear and compare their feedback concerning the submitted images before competition night. These are serious problems but we feel we are up to the challenge and we hope changes will be in place for the 2015-16 year.

Competitions are only one aspect of our Club activities. There are many more benefits from being a member: friendships forged, information shared and stimulation from the many presentations.

I would like to wish you all a Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukah, Happy New Year and Happy Holidays.

How to Photograph Holiday Lights

These tips refer to capturing outdoor lights but much can be applied to indoor situations as well, e.g. mixing ambient light.

- Do NOT wait until dark. Choose your scene and get set up before the natural light of day fades away.
- Capture lots of sky, the afterglow of the evening sky if possible. A low position should help.
- Set White Balance to Tungsten. This will capture the lights correctly and set the sky to royal blue.
- Try for some reflective foreground (snow, a puddle, a car roof) to add interest.
- Shoot on a tripod (or other support such as a bean bag, for example) for 1/4 to 1 second; use a cable release.
- Take an occasional test shot as you wait for a golden mix of natural ambient light and decorative lights.

How to Create a Slide Show Presentation

A slide show competition gives you a chance to examine a specific subject through the creation of an audio-visual presentation. It requires some forethought and organization to pull it all together. Like most things in photography, there are no hard and fast rules governing this kind of work but there are some strong recommendations to consider

In preparation for our annual MCC Slideshow Competition on March 30, 2015 there will be a half-evening dedicated to tips on how to put a slide show together (2nd half of Nature, January 26, 2015).

John will present general guidelines, and some thoughts and advice on organizing a slide show with an emphasis on choosing the theme, images, music and determining the timing.

Don't miss out on this opportunity to be introduced to software programs ProShow Gold or Proshow Producer (PC) and Keynote or Fotomagico (Mac) and to better understand this competition.



Monday, January 19, 2015 Patrick LaRoque

PROXIMITY: STORIES FROM THE INVISIBLE— A REFLECTION ON PHOTOGRAPHIC SUBJECTS AND VISUAL STORYTELLING



As photographers, we are a race of explorers and we seem wired to look for the exotic, the Moment with a capital M that will eclipse all others. We long for the extraordinary... But what if the extraordinary is right here, right now, waiting for us to lift it from obscurity?

My presentation is an attempt at restarting in my listeners this perhaps lost ability to see what's in front of us, at rediscovering the mundane in order to find our own personal voice. It also explores the notion of visual storytelling and essays, not only as a means of expression but also as a way of redefining our relationship to the photographic subject, by moving away from the idea of the single image and embracing an extended narrative.

Biography

Patrick LaRoque is a free-lance photographer based in Montreal. He captures images of people, spaces, streets and products; he shoots to expose a narrative, no matter the subject.

LaRoque got his first taste of photography with an old Kodak camera his parents had left lying around the house. Later, he continued with his father's Yashica Electro 35 and in college, a Pentax K1000. Music then pretty much took over his life and he only came back to photography with the advent of digital cameras. He made the jump professionally seven years ago, leaving behind a partnership in a television and multimedia production company of which he was the creative director. In 2011 he purchased a Fujifilm X100 to use on a trip to France, intending to go back to the roots of photography on his own time. The fixed 35mm lens forced him into working within its constraints - it changed "everything." More importantly, it triggered his intense interest with the narrative form which has since become a very important part of both his personal and professional work. Apart from a few brief courses in college, he is completely self-taught.

In 2012, LaRoque founded the KAGE COLLECTIVE, an international group of eight independent photographers from six different countries, focused on visual essays and documentary projects. He is also an official Fujifilm X Photographer.









I hope you enjoy the diversity of the images I've taken over the years as I am truly looking forward to sharing them with you.


Biography


I am a Location Scout specializing in Urban Nature environments for television and film. I am also an editorial and commercial photographer concentrating on environmental

SLIDE SHOW COMPETITION

It is time for MCC members to show their photography, creativity and imagination in the Digital Slide Show competition to be presented at the meeting of March 30, 2015.

Take this opportunity to experiment, learn new tricks and have some fun. The Catherine Rasmussen Trophy will be awarded to the winner of the competition on Awards Night. All class A and class B members are eligible to enter.

Judges:

The judges are comprised of all the Club members and guests in the audience. Judges will be asked to consider how well the following elements work together to create an imaginative, entertaining and original presentation: theme; image quality; editing; story flow & pacing; music, sound effects and/or commentary and, finally, titles.

Rules:

- 1. The presentation may be on any subject of the photographer's choice.
- 2. An identifying title should be included.
- 3. For this competition, the maker's name must **not** be indicated in the presentation.
- 4. The presentation shall be no longer than 4 minutes. It may be shorter.
- 5. The presentation shall be provided to John Surridge no later than the meeting previous to 16 March 2015 so that they may be tested and a judging list can be prepared. Please note that no entries will be accepted on the evening of the competition.
- 6. Submissions shall be on CD, DVD or USB key with your name clearly indicated on the media but **not** in the presentation.
- 7. A sign-up sheet will be available at the Club in January for registration. You must indicate whether your presentation will be Mac- or PC-based.
- 8. Presentations shall be self-running, independent of the software used for creation.

Technicalities to Bear in Mind:

Software: You will require some type of software to prepare your slide show. This can be as "simple" as Microsoft PowerPoint, Keynote or Open Office Impress, (I say "simple" because sometimes working with these is anything but simple.) or as complex as Photodex Proshow Producer. The mid-range favourites are Proshow Gold for PC and Fotomagico for Mac. They have extensive capabilities for a reasonable investment (about \$75). Pix2exe is another program with good capabilities for a similar cost advertised as available for both Mac and PC. There are various free options available on the internet but I cannot speak to their capabilities. Lightroom and Photoshop Elements have slide show capabilities but they are limited with respect to the transitions, music handling and formats in which the shows can be saved.

In testing out options, look for a program that can output a self-running (stand-alone) file. This may be an .exe file for PC systems, or an app for Mac systems, or an .avi or .mov video file. Ensure that you can save your show to a CD, DVD or, preferably, a USB key. If possible, try it out on another computer to see if it runs independently and that all music is properly functioning. If you are not sure, create a preliminary test show and bring it to me in February or early March so that we test it and correct any problems in time for submission to the competition.

Most slide show software, if left to default settings, will create your show at what it thinks is a reasonable image size (800×600 or 1200×800) depending on the resolution capabilities of your computer's video card and what the program thinks is a proper file size. The true resolution of the Club projector is 1400×1050 pixels. Try to set your show for approximately this image size. I say approximately because 1400×1050 has an aspect ratio of 4:3 (so an image that is 4 feet high will be 3 feet wide) and your images may not respect this proportion. Adjust your show to a maximum of 1400 pixels horizontally. Going to HD format (1920×1080 pixels) is overkill and the projector will downsize them to suit its true resolution.

Music

Ensure that any music or sound track is in fact "attached" to your show when you save the show or burn it to a disk. As a precaution, make sure to provide the music file with your show when you submit it to me. There is a substantial difference in a presentation's appeal with or without music. Additionally, if you obtain your music files through iTunes or similar on-line stores, then ensure that you have the right to use the file on any machine. We have had a case in the past where moving the show to the Club's computer invalidated the right to the use of the music. The show played, but silently.

Final Word:

When burning to a CD or DVD, please ensure that the disk is "closed" and prepared for reading on another computer. We have had problems with this in the past for CDs created on Macs.

TRIBUTE Yseult Mounsey

Three past MCC members, Yseult Mounsey, Dorothy Benson and Blossom Caron have been included in a Concordia University study of Canadian female photographers born prior to 1925. The Club has provided information about our photographers as well as several others who might also be of relevance to this project.

The fact that the Club had in its possession 151 original prints by Yseult Mounsey was of special interest to the researcher. Works by Blossom Caron are included in the National Archives collection and the Dorothy Benson collection is held by Queen's University. Stephanie Hornstein, who is conducting the Concordia research, contacted the McCord Museum regarding the existence of Yseult's prints. As a result, the Club has agreed to donate the entire collection to the museum.

Yseult was active in both the print and color slide divisions of the MCC in the late 1950s and throughout the 60s. She competed in, and won, the top trophies in both divisions. Noted for her versatility as well as the excellent technical quality of her monochrome prints, she also helped other MCCers with lectures and workshops on various aspects of the printing process.

Yseult exhibited successfully in International Exhibitions in Canada, the U.S. and Europe. She won both local and Canadian prizes in Newspaper Snapshot Awards contests and was one of the very few Canadian photographers ever to win the Grand Prize in that contest (in 1964). She also won awards in several Quebec provincial exhibitions and had prints included in exhibitions sponsored by the city of Montreal. In 1969 a solo show of her prints was held in Montreal.

Yseult served as Co-Chairman of the Women's World Exhibition of Photography held at the Hospitality Pavilion in Expo 67. She was also Color Division Chairman of the MCC and was awarded an Associateship in the Club.

The Club is pleased that the work of one of its most distinguished members will be included in the McCord Museum collection.
