The Club has enjoyed an excellent fall season with some wonderful and, I may say, very well-attended lectures. We have acquired quite a few new members and are approaching our usual numbers after a dip last year.

I am working with another member of the Executive on a project to upgrade our current projection equipment. A brighter, sharper image will greatly improve every member's experience of both competition photos and quest lecture presentations.

What's New & Updated! New Ribbon Categories for Nature Competitions —Ellie McCrea, Ilana Block, Co-Chairs

In the past, only two ribbons were awarded: one each for the highest overall mark in class "A" and the highest overall mark in class "B."

To encourage members to participate in all the different Nature categories, as well as to conform with what the Pictorial Competitions have been doing, a change has been made to the presentation of the ribbons in Nature Competitions. From now on there will be six blue ribbons in total (excluding Honourable mentions and ties):

- 1-Winner in Class A Highest score from Class A (in any category);
- 2-Winner in Class B Highest score from Class B (in any category);

one blue ribbon per category, whether from Class A or B, for the winner in each category;

- 3-Winner in Action:
- 4-Winner in Botany;
- 5-Winner in General;
- 6-Winner in Zoology.

Note: The eligibility for awards and trophies at the end of the year is based on overall scores and the required number of entries from the different categories, and not on the number of ribbons awarded during the season. Therefore, this change in the number of ribbons awarded does not alter anything with regards to calculations for awards and trophies at the end of this, or any, year. Please refer to the MCC website under "Membership" for the document "Trophies, Honours & Awards" for further details.


How to Do Selective Colour

Selective color is a post-processing technique where most of an image is converted to black and white while some parts are left in colour. Typically, this is accomplished by using layers and masks in Photoshop or some other photo-editing software. The selective color technique is used to draw attention to the subject and can achieve a very artistic result.

Flea Market

Linda Rutenberg The Inquisitive Eye— A Thirty-Year Passion



Linda will take us on an exploration of her significant photographic series and show us the links and the threads that have permeated her work. She will begin with her early black and white street work, move through her Mont Royal project (shot in infrared) and show how and why she chose her various approaches. Then she will move into the digital phase and discuss the changes this technological

move brought about in her photography and how her night images and the subsequent Garden at Night project contained many of the same concepts and ideas as those found in her earlier work.

Linda will spend the second half of the evening talking about how the Gaspé enterprise began, the difficulties of working in the winter and how the project developed over time. She will provide tips and information on how to work creatively in this challenging time of the year.

Starting with her early street work in New York City, her distinctive style has been forged in exotic locations and often in the depths of night. Istanbul Street Musicians



I'm British and have worked in several places internationally, ending up with developing electric power stations in Turkey and moving to Istanbul in 2000. At retirement in 2012, I took up photography more seriously, beginning with imperial mosque interiors because of their wonderful form, colour, line and textures. In summer 2012, a local gallery exhibited a series of

my large-scale, 16th-century Iznik tile images from these mosques, along with examples of my structural compound images and art photography. The exhibit then moved to the British Consulate at the time of the Queen's visit to Turkey.

Wishing to move on to people-photography and building on a love of a wide range of music, I started photographing Istanbul street musicians in late 2012. As a frustrated musician myself, I decided to focus on details, emotions, musical signaling and other communications between the musicians themselves and with their audience. Catching the moment requires taking images in the hundreds per session. To get closer and build up my relationship with the performers, I started sharing the images I took with them. To this day, I maintain close relationships with many of the musicians, even though my wife, Elaine, and I moved to Montreal in 2014.

The scope of street music in Istanbul is quite broad, from traditional Turkish, Kurdish and Black Sea music to jazz, Iranian, Gypsy, French, Japanese and the countries of many other travellers passing through the city. On any afternoon or evening, one can see 10-15 players or groups of players on Istiklal Caddesi, Istanbul's main walking street on the European side and my main hunting ground.

Introduction to Cross-Polarization in Macro Photography

An often forgotten and rarely used old-school technique, cross-polarization lighting was developed as a scientific procedure to examine glass for anomalies. Fine-art reproduction photographers quickly adopted it as an excellent way to eliminate all reflections from the texture of a painting.

It has since evolved for use in dental and dermatological digital photography to produce detailed images without the contamination of reflections from a light source.

In this presentation, you will be introduced to the basic science behind cross-polarized lighting, including proven techniques you can apply to your macro photography.

Once mastered, cross-polarization lighting techniques can also be applied to a variety of controlled lighting photography to produce clean, rich colors in a glare-free image.

MCC Member Presentation Phillip Shapiro Stacking Images



Phillip Shapiro will present a tutorial on the very valuable technique of image stacking.

Why stack images? Good question! One of the most common reasons is to take images of very faint objects that are barely discernible in any single exposure. By "stacking" several images together, you can create a "synthesized long exposure" that is brighter than any of the individual source images. For example, if your digital camera is limited to taking images with exposures of 30 seconds or less, it is impossible to take pictures of a moonlit landscape, which typically requires an exposure of a few minutes. However, if you take six exposures (each of 30 seconds) and then stack them together, you can create a synthesized 3-minute exposure.

Image Stacker is a shareware program, which combines—or "stacks"—multiple images into a single image, using one of several different blending methods. Image Stacker can be used for a variety of purposes, but the primary purposes

are (1) to create very long exposures (longer than would be possible using any single exposure) (2) to create star-trail images and (3) to reduce the appearance of "digital noise."

I will also demonstrate "focus stacking" in Photoshop using an image of apples. If you do not have Adobe Photoshop, you can download a free software program called Gimp, which is an open-source tool that lets you create and edit images. You can crop, add text, resize, and create nested layers.

If time permits, I will also show how to do star trails using free specialized software called StarStaX. This is powerful photo-editing software that creates stacked images from your photos to generate amazing effects. With features like gap filling, blending, and overlaying dark frames, this tool helps you create works of art from your time-lapse and other photos.

MCC Member Presentation Danny Taran Taran Adventures

The slideshow I will be presenting encompasses two recent trips, one to South America and Antarctica, and the second to Iceland.

I will take you on my South American journey to San Diego, Valparaiso, Buenos Aires, and to the Iguazu Falls as seen from both Argentina and Brazil. These images will be followed by the Antarctic section, which includes the Falkland Islands, illustrating the breathtaking beauty of this continent and its different breeds of penguins.

My second series of images will reveal Iceland, an island of impressive waterfalls, geophysical events, the famous Icelandic ponies, and all of these in this most spectacular of landscapes.







Biography

I have been a member of the Montreal Camera Club since 1978 and was Club President from 1982 to 1984. My travels over the years to the seven continents of the world inspired my passion for photography. I used my camera to record the different cultures and scenery that I encountered in my travels both for my own and the pleasure of others.

For the last ten years, I have dedicated my life to different philanthropic causes, using my photography as a vehicle to raise funds.

My first endeavor was to award individuals who increased their charitable donations by awarding them with a print of their choice from over 100 images. These images were from

my collection and that of six other Club members who also graciously donated their photographs.

Another fundraising project was my self-published 252-page coffee table book, *The 4000 Year Journey in Search of Peace*. Ten thousand books were printed and sold, raising over \$400,000 for different charities.

The Liane and Danny Taran Foundation is my current undertaking. I have donated over 1,400 framed photographs to hospitals and retirement homes to make them more humane and comforting and to bring art and beauty into these often-sterile environments.

DIGITAL SLIDE SHOW COMPETITION

Rules & Guidelines

-John Surridge

We have seen great presentations by Michelle Valberg, Michael Cooper and Will Allan at the Club. Now it is your turn to show your photography, creativity and imagination in the Digital Slideshow competition to be presented at the meeting of April 18, 2016.

Don't miss this chance to experiment, learn new tricks and have some fun. The Catherine Rasmussen Trophy will be awarded to the winner of the competition on Awards Night. All members in both class A and class B are eliqible to enter.

Judges:

The judges will consist of the Club members and guests in the audience. Judges will be asked to consider how well the following elements work together to create an imaginative, entertaining and original presentation: theme; image quality; editing; story flow and pacing; music; sound effects and commentary; titles.

Rules:

- 1. The presentation may be on any subject of the photographer's choice.
- 2. An identifying title should be included.
- 3. For this competition, the maker's name should NOT be included ANYWHERE in the presentation.
- 4. The presentation shall be no longer than 4 minutes. It may be shorter.
- 5. The presentation shall be submitted to John Surridge no later than April 11th (the meeting previous to April 18th) so that it may be tested and a judging list can be prepared. Please note that we no longer accept entries on the evening of the competition.
- 6. Submissions shall be on CD, DVD or USB key with your name clearly indicated on the media (and NOT in the slideshow presentation).
- 7. A sign-up sheet will be available at the Club in January. You must indicate whether your presentation will be Mac- or PC-based.
- 8. Presentations should be self-running (stand-alone, independent of the software used for its creation).

Some Helpful Hints:

Although you may choose any theme, subject or range of subjects, your show should be cohesive. The time allotted, 4 minutes, is fairly short. You might like to go through your image collection and come up with a show that is funny or offbeat. Choose top quality images with good technique and composition. Take the opportunity to edit your images so that you do not repeat similar images unless you have a specific point to make. Eliminate images that do not advance your story. Be ruthless!

Music selections should complement the subject matter. If you are using commentary, the remarks should be concise and the information accurate and lighthearted. Personal anecdotes can often help advance the story and keep the audience interested.

Pacing and tempo are of the utmost importance—six to eight seconds per slide is a good starting point. You may vary the amount of time per slide according to the type and timing of transitions used to move from one image to another and the relationship to the musical accompaniment.



Other Thoughts to Bear in Mind:

Software: You will require some type of software to prepare your slideshow. This can be as simple as using Microsoft PowerPoint, Keynote or OpenOffice Impress, or as complex as using Photodex Proshow. The mid-range favourites are Proshow Gold for PC and Fotomagico for Mac. They have extensive capabilities for a reasonable investment (about \$75). Pix2exe is another program with good capabilities for a similar cost, advertised as available for both Mac and PC. There are various free options available on the Internet, but I am not familiar with their capabilities. Lightroom and Photoshop Elements have slideshow capabilities, but they are limited as to types of transitions, music handling and formats in which the shows can be saved.

In testing out options, please try to find a program that has the capability to give you a self-running (stand-alone) file. This may be an .exe file for PC systems or an .app file for Mac systems, or possibly an .avi or .mov file. Ensure that you can save your show to a CD, DVD or USB key. If possible, try it out on a different computer, or media center, to see if it runs independently and that all music is properly functioning. If you are not sure, create a test and bring it to me in February or early March so that we can try it out and if problems are found they can be corrected in time for submission to the competition.

Most slideshow software, if left to default settings, will create your show at what it thinks is a reasonable image size (800x600 or 1200x800). The true resolution of the Club's projector is 1400x1050 pixels. Try to set your show for approximately this image size. Each of your images may not respect this 4:3 proportion. In that case, adjust your image size to a maximum of 1400 pixels for those using a horizontal format and 1050 for images using a vertical format. The HD format (1920x1080 pixels) is overkill, and the projector will downsize your images to suit its true resolution.

Set up a named directory or folder on your hard drive for your show to receive all images, clip art, music, sound effects, etc. Copy all these files to this directory rather than moving your originals. This is also where you will save all intermediate versions of your slideshow. Depending on your level of comfort with the computer, sub-folders for images, music and slideshow versions may be advantageous. Remember, to be on the safe side, always work with copies and never the originals of your images.

Music:

Ensure that any music or soundtrack is in fact "attached" to your slideshow when you save the show or burn it to disk. As a precaution, make sure to provide the music file with your show when you submit it to me. As demonstrated at last year's competition, there is a substantial difference in a presentation's appeal with music as opposed to a silent show.

If you obtain your music files through iTunes or similar on-line stores, ensure that you have the right to use the file on any machine. We have had a problem in the past where moving the show to the Club's computer invalidated the right to the use of the music. The slideshow played, but silently.

Final Word:

When burning to a CD or DVD, please ensure that the disk is "closed" and prepared for reading on another computer. We have had problems with this in the past for CDs created on Macs.

Good luck and let's see those shows!

The evening will end with a presentation of previous Slideshow winners.



To get to the park from the east:

- —take Autoroute Ville-Marie/720 West (note: 720 becomes Autoroute 20, also called the "Autoroute du Souvenir");
- —turn north onto Autoroute 13 N and pass under Côte de Liesse, and then
- —take exit 3-O (3 West) from Autoroute 13 N onto Rue de la Station;
- —turn right (west) onto Chemin de la Côte de Liesse (this is the north service road of Autoroute de la Côte de Liesse which is Autoroute 520);
- —Turn right onto Avenue Lajoie and, when you reach Avenue Jenkins, turn left. The park is close-by. You now face the airport runways!
